GOLD LOGO GETS A NEW LOOK!

With the help of several community partners, GOLD now has a new logo, featured above. County high school students brainstormed ideas for the logo. The winning concept came from Stephen Decatur High School student Rachel Thomas, who submitted an umbrella image, to symbolize the protection and shelter that GOLD offers to those in crisis. The organization's signature color also make an appearance, both in the font color and the sunshine emanating beneath the umbrella.

Local company D3Corp then developed a polished, professional logo using the umbrella concept. D3 Corp donates its services for the design and maintenance of the organization's website. The website will also get an updated look in 2016. Among other improvements, it will be more mobile-device friendly.

The logo is part of a greater effort to better promote the organization's brand, present a consistent visual image to stakeholders and potential donors, and be more recognizable in the community. Supporters can look forward to seeing the logo on updated versions of GOLD's letterhead, website, Facebook page, and other promotional materials in 2016.


Data is an essential component to running a successful organization, and its importance only increases as competition for donor dollars grows. For the last year, GOLD has been in the process of working towards a new data collection system that will make valuable information accessible in a way it has not been in the past.

The new system will replace the paper-based referral process in use now. Currently, referrals for GOLD's programs are made on a paper form completed by a caseworker. With the new system, incoming electronic data will automatically be entered in a database. This will allow GOLD to determine overall program use for any individual client, or search by criteria such as town of residence, age, sex, or family size.



Better data will allow GOLD to correlate its own programs with local, state and national trends related to poverty, homelessness Community and food insecurity, and be more competi-Foundation tive when seeking grants. Hard numbers will be available to better illustrate to stakeholders in the community that projects are necessary and effective. The data system is being funded in part by a Community Needs grant from the Community Foundation of the Eastern Shore.

As part of the research process to determine the requirements for the system, staff and volunteers have been experimenting with current data. The pie chart below shows how emergency assistance funds were allocated last year. We look forward to bringing even more charts, graphs and information to you in the future!



Serving Up Special Projects

GOLD serves families in need each year through three special projects which provide spring baskets, school supplies and holiday gifts. Over 1,000 individuals benefitted from the *Helping Hands for the Holidays* project in 2015, and 460 kids were given backpacks and school supplies in the fall. The 2106 *Spring Basket* project provided baskets to 22% more children than in the previous year.

GOLD could not provide these services without the help of sponsors in the community. Many sponsors also helped spread the word by posting photos on social media, or by sending in pictures to be posted on GOLD's Facebook page.
